Monday: BANK HOLIDAY

Tuesday: A few weeks ago, we celebrated the 75th Anniversary of VE Day. The day that Winston Churchill (our Prime Minister at the time) declared that the war was over. It was a historic day and some people alive today still have memories of the celebrations that took place. This year, for the 75th Anniversary, lots of large-scale commemorative events had been planned to mark the occasion but unfortunately these had to be cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic. However, this did not mean that we 'ignored' the day, instead we found different ways to show our appreciation for those who fought and celebrate the victory they achieved.

Reading comprehension:

Complete the Reading comprehension from the Daily News from the 75th VE Day Commemorative Anniversary.

Wednesday: In years to come, when Britain celebrates the 100th Anniversary of VE day, the 125th Anniversary of VE day and so on, they will talk about how different the 75th celebrations were: when the country was locked down - a moment in history.

75th Anniversary of VE Day Commemorated

What was the Second World War?

- The Second World War was a global conflict that lasted from 1939-1945.
- It was the largest war in history and cost the lives of between 40 to 60 million people.

The Royal Mint has created commemorative coins to mark VE Day this year. This is because today is the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War in Europe.

The special £2 coins have the word 'victory' above the heads of a celebrating crowd. Rays from searchlights spill out from behind the crowd. These represent "rays of hope on the evening of VE Day," according to the coin's designer, Dominique Evans.

The coins can be bought from the Royal Mint; prices for the coins range from £10 up to £1055. A donation from each sale will go to support the Imperial War Museum.

Stephen Walton, a senior curator at the museum, said that there were many challenges after VE Day in 1945. He went on to say people believed that "out of an unprecedented global catastrophe, a better human society should emerge".

At 11 a.m. this morning, there will be a two-minute silence to commemorate VE Day. At 9 p.m. this evening, The Queen will address the nation. This is the exact time that her father, George VI, gave a speech on VE Day, 75 years ago.

What is VE Day?

Although the Second World War continued elsewhere, the battles that took place in Europe

came to an end on $7^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ May 1945 when Germany surrendered.

The following day, at 3 p.m., the UK prime minister, Winston Churchill, made an announcement on the radio. He let people know that the war in Europe had ended.

Upon hearing the news, people held big parties to celebrate. Even Princess Elizabeth (who later became our Queen) secretly left Buckingham Palace to celebrate with people on the street.

However, it was also a day of great sadness as people remembered those who had died.
